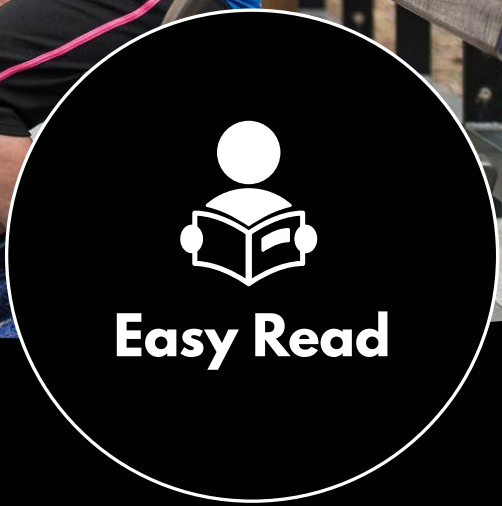




Transport for everyone

Public transport means things like buses or trains.



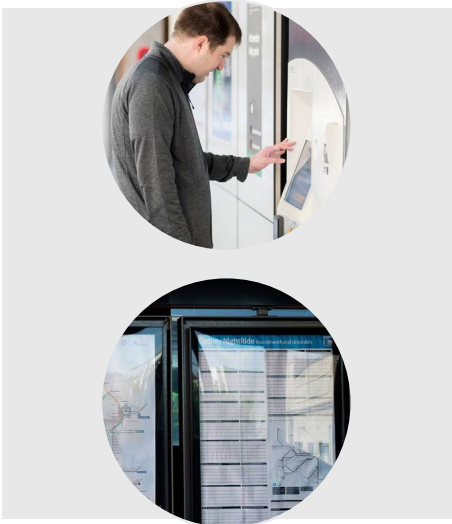
People with intellectual disability use public transport like everyone else.

- Train and bus timetables.

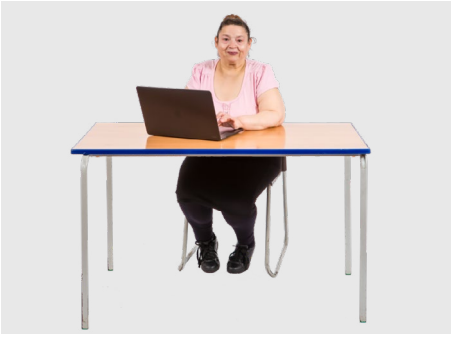
How are things now

This makes it hard for them to get the information.

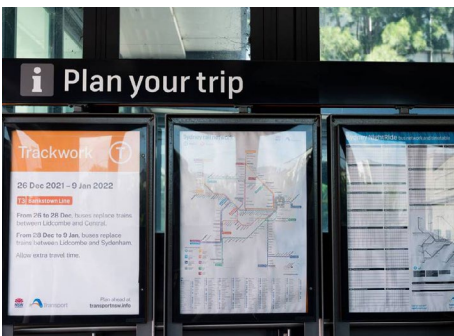
Right to transport



People with intellectual disability have the right to use public transport.

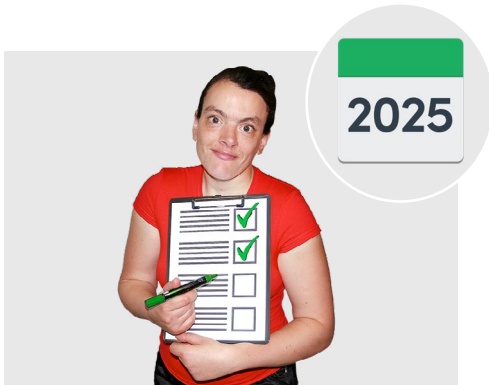


The law says the NSW Government has to try to make sure people with intellectual disability can use public transport.

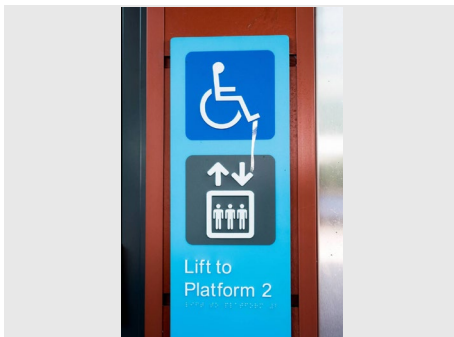


The NSW Government needs to try to make sure transport information is easy to understand.

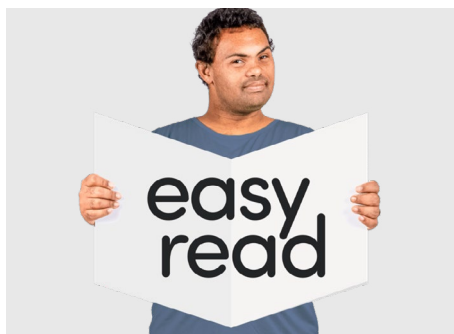
What needs to happen



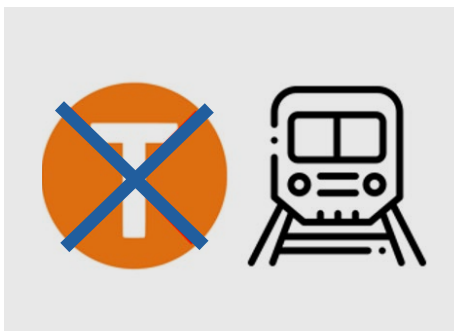
These are the things CID wants the NSW Government to do by 2025.



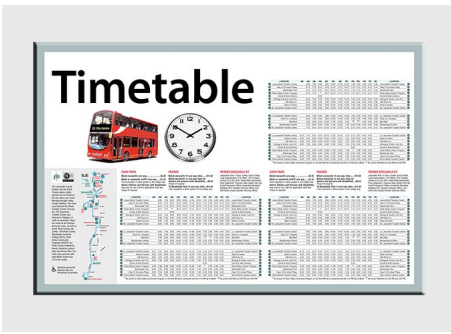
Information about public transport should be easy to understand for people with intellectual disability.

There should be more signs with pictures to help people understand.



Times on timetables should use **am** and **pm** to show morning and afternoon.



All transport staff must get training in how to support people with disability.



You must be able to buy Opal cards at all stations.



People with intellectual disability should be part of all new Government plans for transport.



This will help make sure plans think about people with intellectual disability from the start.
