Your right to vote



People with intellectual disability are allowed to vote in Local government elections in New South Wales.



There is a Local government election on 4 December 2021.

You can vote.



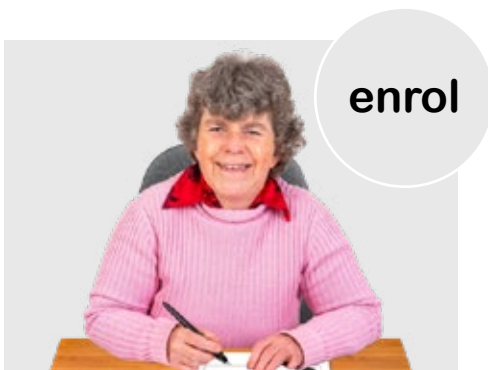
In Local government elections you help decide who will be on the council in your area.

Enrol to vote

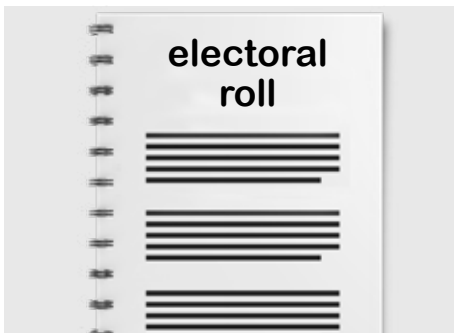


You must vote if

- You are 18 years or older
- You are an Australian citizen

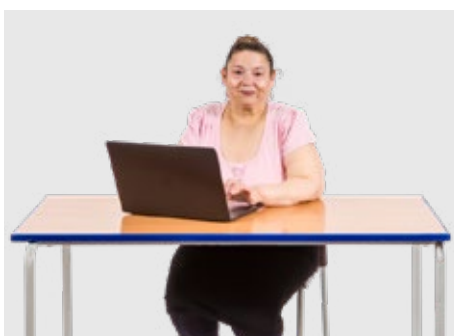


Before you can vote you must enrol.



When you enrol your name is added to the list of people who can vote.

This list is called the **electoral roll**.



To check if you are on the electoral roll go to **www.aec.gov.au**

If your name is not on the electoral roll

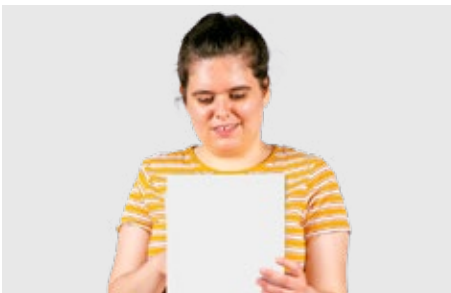


It is ok if your name is not on the electoral roll.

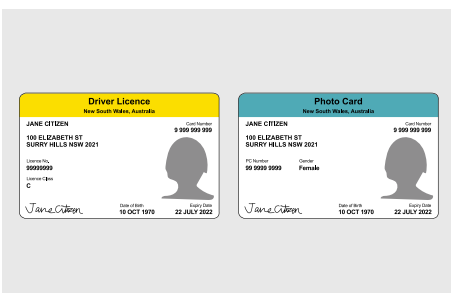
You can make a declaration vote at the polling place.



Declaration vote means that you say that you are allowed to vote.



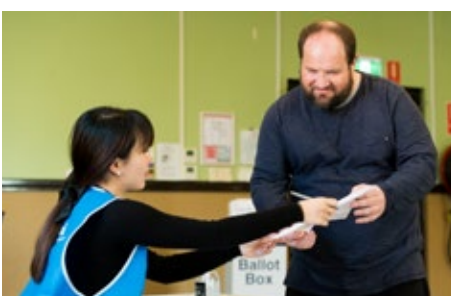
You will then get the ballot paper for the area you say you can vote for.



To make a declaration vote you must bring your

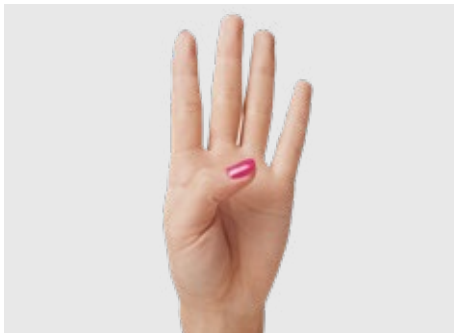
- NSW Drivers Licence or
- NSW Photo Card

These are the only types of ID you can bring.



You can ask the election staff if you need help with your declaration vote.

Voting in the NSW Local government elections

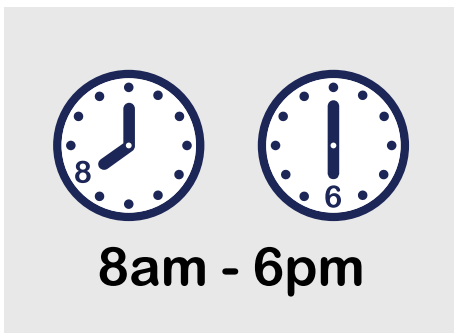


There are 4 ways you can vote in the Local government elections.



1. On election day

Election day will be on 4 December 2021.



You can vote between 8am and 6pm.



If you need help you can take a friend, family member or support worker with you.



You need to go to a polling place to vote.

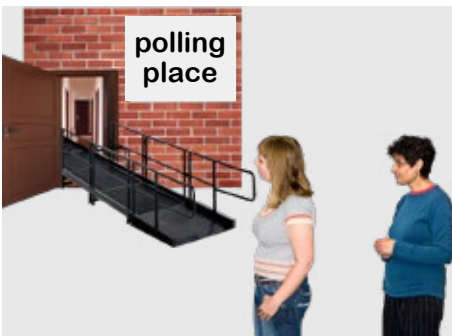
This could be a school, a church or the council.

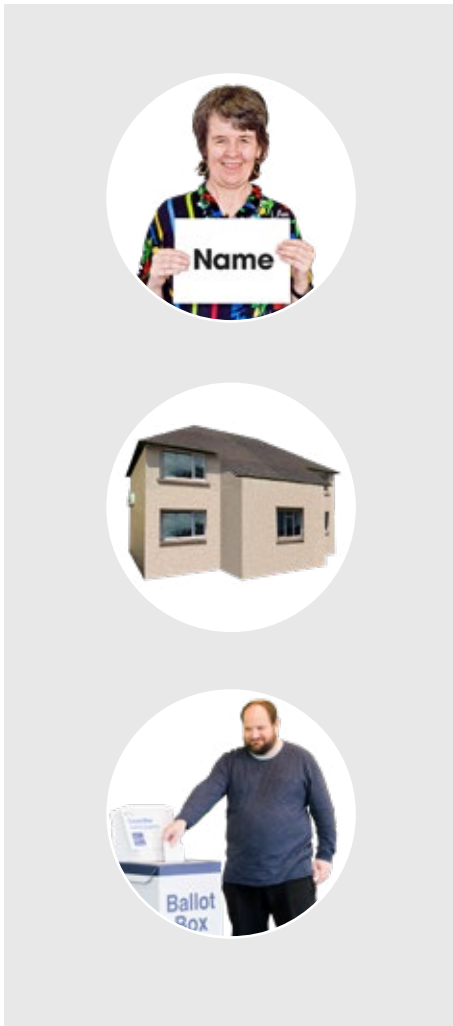


You might need to stand in a line at the polling place before you get inside.



When you get inside the polling place there will be staff wearing blue vests.

They are election officials and are there to help you.

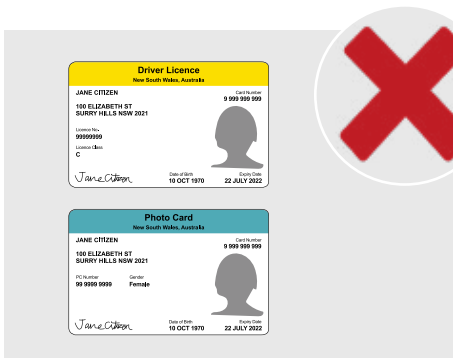


When it is your turn an election official will ask you

1. Your name

2. Where you live and

3. If you have already voted in this election.



You do not need to show ID to have your name marked off the roll.



The staff will then give you ballot papers to vote with.

Ballot papers are your voting papers.



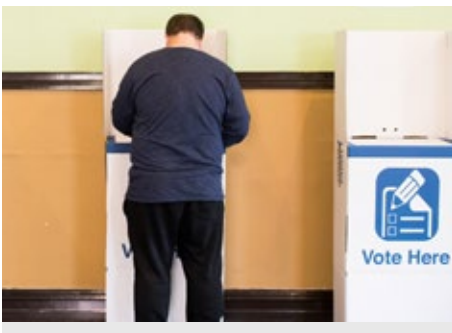
Take your papers to the booth and fill them out.



When you have finished fold the ballot paper and put it in the ballot box.



If you need help you can ask an election official.



2. Early voting in person

You can go to some polling places before election day to vote.

3. Postal vote

Postal vote means you will get your ballot papers in the mail.



Fill out your ballot papers and post them back.

4. iVote
