

Working with First Nations People with Intellectual Disability
12 Inclusive Communication Tips

- 1 Support people with intellectual disability to feel comfortable and welcome.
- 2 Make an effort to understand people with intellectual disability.
- 3 Talk to people with intellectual disability clearly.
- 4 Ask open questions.
- 5 One topic at a time.
- 6 Always check if people with intellectual disability want a supporter.
- 7 Extra care and patience over the phone.
- 8 Repeat new information.
- 9 Have pictures and visuals ready.
- 10 Check in with people with intellectual disability often.
- 11 Ask people with intellectual disability what is needed with respect.
- 12 Give people with intellectual disability as much information in Easy Read as you can.
